HAMPSHIRE AND ISLE OF WIGHT.

THE Provincial Grand Master Bro. W. W. B. Beach, M.P., accompanied by his Officers, visited the Southampton Lodge on the 21st ult., and in response to the toast of his health, proposed by the W.M. Bro. Fairweather, expressed the pleasure it gave him to see the Brethren of the Province attending the ceremony at Southampton Docks in such large numbers. He added that many who were not in the Craft were so impressed that they had wished for the first time in their lives that they were Freemasons. Referring to the Charity work of the Province, the P.G.M. said that he sat next to the Grand Master the Prince of Wales, at the Centenary Festival of the Boys School, and when the Hampshire and Isle of Wight list was read out His Royal Highness exclaimed heartily "hear, hear."

NORFOLK.

THE minds of local Masons have been greatly exercised since Lord Suffield resigned his position as Grand Master of the Province of Norfolk, as to the date when the successor appointed by his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales would be installed. Only so recently as Tuesday of last week, at Wymondham, Bro. Hamon le Strange, the Provincial Grand Master-designate, announced that nothing definite had been decided with regard to the time of the ceremony. It appears that within the past few days active steps had been taken in making arrangements for the function, which we understand will take place on Thursday, 1st December, probably in Blackfriars Hall, Norwich. In the unavoidable absence of the Prince of Wales, Lord Euston will carry out the duties of Installing Master. On the same day Sir Francis Boileau will be installed as Grand Superintendent of the Norfolk Provincial Chapter of Royal Arch Masons. Such an interesting occasion will bring together a large number of notabilities in the Craft, many of whom will, we learn, be entertained by Sir Francis Boileau at Ketteringham.—"Eastern Daily Press."

CORNWALL.

Edgcumbe Past Deputy Grand Master of England has appointed Bro. Bernard F. Edyvean P.M. 330 P. Prov. S.G.W. P.A.G.D.C. of England to succeed the lamented Bro. Edward Dixon Anderton P.G.D. of England, &c., as Provincial Grand Secretary of Cornwall. The appointment, though honorary, is one of an arduous and difficult character, requiring not only the full confidence of Lord Mount Edgcumbe, but also considerable acquaintance with the usages, laws, and customs of the Fraternity, locally and generally. Bro. Edyvean (of Bodmin) represents one of the oldest Cornish families, his estates being held in direct succession for some six centuries, and is much esteemed for his successful labours in connection with the management of the votes for Cornwall in the Central Masonic Charities. The appointment will be a most popular one throughout the Province, none could in fact be more so, and it will be a satisfaction to the Brethren to know that with the able services of Bro. J. C. R. Crewes, clerk assistant to the Prov. G. Sec., Bro. Edyvean hopes to be able to continue his duties as manager of the votes as before. He will also be Scribe E. of the Prov. Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, by request of the beloved Grand Superintendent.—"Western Morning News."

SUSSEX.

A CORDIAL, loyal, and fraternal greeting was accorded to H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, K.G., Past Grand Master Provincial Grand Master of Sussex when he visited the ancient Borough of Lewes, on Friday, 28th ult., for the purpose of holding his Provincial Grand Lodge. It was a bright warm sunny day, and the old town was en fête. It appeared by the number of people in the streets to be a general holiday, and indeed it was an occasion of some importance, seeing that the last Royal visit to Lewes of a public character took place sixty-eight years ago. The railway station was decorated with evergreens and flags, and presented quite a festive appearance.

The Duke of Connaught travelled down from Victoria by the ordinary train of the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway, to which a special saloon carriage was attached. H.R.H. was accompanied by Bro. John F. S. Gooday, General Manager of the line, Bro. Sir W. T. Marriott, M.P., Deputy Provincial Grand Master, General Randolph, and other Grand and Provincial Officers. Upon arrival he was received by the Mayor (Bro. Gates) and the Corporation, who presented an address of welcome, to which the Duke made a graceful reply and thanked them for their kindly greeting. He then entered a carriage with the Mayor and Sir William Marriott, being saluted by the Guard of Honour stationed outside, and drove round the town, stopping for a few minutes at the Schools, where the children sang the National Anthem.

The Brethren had meanwhile assembled at the handsome and commodious Town Hall, where luncheon was provided by Brother Tuff, of the White Hart Hotel, previous to the business of the day. The string band of the Buffs discoursed sweet music during the meal, and played the National Anthem upon the entry of the Provincial Grand Master.

At the conclusion of the repast H.R.H. proposed the usual Masonic toasts, wisely adopting and advocating brevity in the speeches.

In submitting the Grand Master he took the opportunity of thanking the Brethren on behalf of his brother for their sympathy lately expressed toward him. He was now much better, and was able to walk by means of a specially constructed apparatus.

Bro. John Strachan Grand Registrar responded for the Grand Officers, and said he was greatly honoured in being connected with such exalted Masons as Lord Lathom, Earl Amherst, and others who carry on the affairs of the Craft in England and her colonies to the advantage of both the members and the empire.

Sir William Marriott proposed the Provincial Grand Master, and said that Sussex was the most fortunate Province in the whole of Great Britain, in having the Duke of Connaught as its Master.

In reply, H.R.H. said: Brethren of Sussex I thank you most warmly for your very cordial welcome. It has been a great pleasure to me to come among you, and I quite appreciate the honour of being your Provincial Grand Master. There is no county in England where Freemasonry is progressing so greatly as in Sussex, whose support of the Masonic Charities is highly commendable. I am glad to visit the historical old town of Lewes, and am pleased to find that the Mayor, like so many other chief magistrates, is a member of our Order.

His Royal Highness next proposed the good health of the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, for which Sir Wm.

Marriott returned thanks.

The Dean of Battle (Very Rev. Bro. E. R. Currie) said he was commanded by H.R.H. to propose the Visitors, of whom they had many distinguished Brethren. He thought it spoke volumes for the universality of Freemasonry that

East and West sat side by side in the Craft. (In explanation of this remark it should be stated that Bro. J. S. Eastes P.G.D. D.P.G.M. Kent, and Bro. Fred West P.G.D. D.P.G.M. Surrey, were placed next to each other at the

table.)

Bro. J. C. Parkinson P.G.D. acknowledged the compliment, saying that the Province of Sussex was well know for its hospitality, and the Visitors were thankful for the kind reception accorded them. The Officers of Grand Lodge were nothing if not critical, and he would congratulate H.R.H. upon the excellent manner in which the work was carried on in his Province.

Bro. Dr. Irwin Scott Prov. Grand Steward returned thanks for the complimentary remarks made by H.R.H. with reference to those who had undertaken the arrangements of

The Brethren then adjourned to the Great Hall, which was converted into the Lodge Room for the occasion. The platform was gaily decorated with flowers, and the banners of the thirty-three Lodges of the Province, ranged round the hall, made a brave show. The Grand Lodge was held under the banners of the South Saxon, No. 311, and the Pelham, No. 1303, Lodges, of which Bros. W. Flint and F. R. Bruce are the Masters,

The Brethren being assembled the Provincial Grand Master, attended by his Officers, walked in procession to the hall, and formally opened the Lodge, after prayer had been offered by the Prov. Grand Chaplain. H.R.H. and his Officers were saluted in due form.

The minutes of the last annual meeting, which was held at Brighton, were read and their correctness confirmed. The roll of the Lodges was called, and it was found that all the Lodges were well represented. Bro. J. M. Reed Provincial Grand Treasurer presented the reports of the Board of Finance, and the Charities Committee, both of which highly satisfactory documents were received and adopted, upon the proposition of Bro. Hawes and Rev. Crick. The Provincial Grand Master then addressed the meeting of Provincial Grand Master then addressed the meeting as follows:

Brethren of Sussex:—It is with great pleasure I attend here to-day to hold the meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge in the celebrated town of Lewes, the antiquity of which is exemplified by the remains of the Castle, the ruins of the Priory, and other associations which are a matter of history. I was also pleased to note your handsome and convenient Temple, of which the foundation stone was laid more than one hundred years ago, and a second stone, laid within the memory of many of you, was the commencement of the handsome building since erected, which I understand is practically free of charges and dedicated to the purposes of Freemasonry for ever. This is the only town in the Province which hitherto has had a building specially appropriated as such. I am also more glad to be here because I was unable to attend any of your Centenary celebrations. I should have rejoiced to participate in your festivities, but the claims of my profession prevented me. I was glad to hear that all went well, and that you had most successful meetings.

Since we last met a Warrant has been granted for a new Liodge at Hastings, which was consecrated by the Very Rev. the Dean of Battle in February last. I am glad to find that, although they have had twelve initiations, this has not in any way affected the other Lodges in the town. The Derwent has had twelve initiations, and, as regards numbers, stands first in the Province. It is also pleasant to know that the addition of the Royal Connaught Lodge to the town of Eastbourne has not interfered with the other Lodges, as they all have a fair share of initiates and joining members. With regard to the other Lodges, they all seem prosperous: only two have been without an initiate, but they have been both had initiate members. they have both had joining members, so that the increase in numbers, after deducting resignations, &c., amounts to 116—a larger addition than has ever been made in any one year in this

Province.

In the Report of the Board of Finance and of General Purposes, it is satisfactory to find that, after all outgoings, and the donation of one hundred guineas to the Freemasons Boys School, there is a satisfactory balance. I am informed that all the returns have been received and the fees paid. I must, however, say I wish I could have heard that there were no arrears of subscriptions. It is not kind to a Brother who, from circumstances, is unable to pay, to keep him on the books, thus increasing his indebtedness. He should be invited to resign at once, if he cannot pay. His arrears would then be small, and could be paid at any time to clear himself, and thus enable him to rejoin the Lodge if approved by the Brethren. With regard to those who can pay but will not, they do not deserve any sympathy; they should be warned, and, if necessary, after due formalities, excluded from the Lodge. I find that there are

eighty-eight Brethren in arrears, owing to the Provincial Grand Lodge £21 9s 6d, representing annual subscriptions of more than £300, and I am afraid that some of the Lodges pay for everyone, even if in arrears. There are thirteen Lodges which do not return any members in arrear; seven return one, four return two, one returns three, one returns four, two return five, one returns seven, one returns eight, one returns eleven, one returns thirteen, and one returns seventeen. I may say that each of these last five has a Past Master for Secretary. I shall be pleased to hear next year that the number of Brethren in arrear has been reduced.

The year has been rather an eventful one in Freemasonry; first, the sudden and distressing death of the wife of our Pro Grand Master, with whom we all sympathised, and to whom I directed the Provincial Grand Secretary to write a letter of condolence, the reply to which you have heard read. Next I must allude to the magnificent meeting at the Albert Hall, at which you have heard, from the report from our Provincial Grand Treasurer, the amount contributed by this Province was most satisfactory, and although some other Provinces sent more this year in proportion to the number of Lodges and members, yet taking the last seven years, and adding up the total, you will find Sussex in the foremost rank. Lastly, we have to condole with our Most Worshipful Grand Master in the unfortunate accident which laid him prostrate for so many weeks, and compelled him to give up many of his engagements. I am sure that we must all be pleased to find that he is restored to his active vigour again. The Grand Lodge sent him a message of sympathy, and I did not think it necessary that it should be formally repeated by the Provincial Grand Lodge, feeling sure that he will believe that the Province over which I preside is loyal to the backbone.

I congratulate our Brother, the Mayor of Lewes, on having such a handsome building in which to receive us. I thank him very much for his kindness in placing the room at our disposal for this splendid meeting, and I am glad they have not been compelled to sacrifice the handsome and interesting staircase which formed one of the glories of the old building. I trust good use is made of the cellars in which the martyrs were confined before they were sacrificed to the superstitions of the age. I hope the town may continue to prosper, and never regret that we are

not still in the old feudal times.

I have had a letter from the W.M. of the Royal Connaught Lodge, asking me, as I allowed the Lodge to be called after me, if I would hold the next meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge at Eastbourne under their banner, but I think I must remember the west end of the Province, before I can again attend at Eastbourne, and cannot at present make any fixture for next year. It is a source of gratification to me that, without making any special prominent effort, the Province of Sussex continues a steady and uninterrupted prosperous course, and I am glad to find that an office in Grand Lodge has been bestowed upon our very worthy

Brother Dr. Alfred King, whom I congratulate most sincerely.

I must express my satisfaction that the Brethren in the small town of East Grinstead have been able to build a Masonic Hall, which I hope and understand is to be specially dedicated to the purposes of Freemasonry, and the principal share in which has been borne by one of my Prov. Grand Officers Bro. J. F. Budd-Budd, who presented the ground and has contributed handsomely to the cost of the building. I wish more Brethren with means were willing to assist our cause in a similar manner. I was sorry my professional engagements prevented me from laying the foundation stone, but I was well and worthily represented by my Deputy Prov. Grand Master, who reports that all was done satisfactorily and in order.

I cannot conclude without again thanking you for your attendance to-day, and for the attention which I find is paid to the details of the several Lodges, both as regards the business and performance of the various ceremonies, which I am assured are, as a rule, all that can be desired. I suppose there are some drones in the hive, but the busy bees are well represented, and I am supported in every possible manner by the great majority of the Brethren, as is shown by the number present.

"A SPRIG OF ACACIA."

E are sorry to record the death of Brother Councillor Samuel Irvin Mills P.M. 1077 and 2584 Provincial Grand Superintendent of Works East Lancashire, which took place on Friday, 21st ult., at the age of forty-eight years. Our Brother, of whom it may be said that he literally died in harness, was on the morning of his seizure in attendance at the Manchester Town Hall, where, in his capacity as representative of Blackley and Moston Ward, he had transacted municipal work in connection with the Parks and Cemeteries Committee, of which he was a member. He was also associated with the Tramways, Improvement, Paving, and Highways Committees.

Immediately preceding lunch he felt somewhat unwell, and retired for the purpose of bathing his throbbing head in cold water. While passing along one of the corridors, he was seen to stagger, and two of the hall attendants immediately ran to his assistance, placing him in a chair. He lapsed into a state of unconsciousness, from which he did not recover, and by direction of Dr. Niven, medical officer of health, whose rooms are in the building, he was conveyed to his home, Green Mount, Queen's Park, in a dying condition, the final dissolution occurring shortly after nine the same

evening.

His end was sudden and unexpected, a visitation of sorrow in the midst of placid serenity; there was no premonition of coming danger, no indication of the intangible presence of Azrael, for on his way to the Town Hall upon the fateful morning he had told a Brother Freemason that he never felt better in his life. As illustrating the excellent state of health which he was then enjoying it may be stated that on the previous Monday he, together with Bro. Thomas Hamnett (a member of the Manchester Board of Guardians). Hamnett (a member of the Manchester Board of Guardians), was present at the annual meeting of the Duchess of York Lodge, No. 2482, when Bro. Councillor Philip Whyman was installed Worshipful Master. In responding as a visitor, Bro. Mills jocularly said he hoped to be present in the same room on the following Monday at a similar ceremony, when another of their visiting Brethren of that evening (Bro. Hamnett) would be installed into the principal chair of the Minnehaha Minstrel Lodge.

The remains were interred at the Southern Cemetery, Withington, on Wednesday, 26th October, the cortége leaving our deceased Brother's residence at 12:30 for Albert Square, where the mourners were joined by a large contingent of municipal representatives and officials of the Corporation. We may mention that along the line of route the streets were occasionally thronged with spectators, the number of carriages in the procession amounting to over thirty, two of these being filled with floral tokens of respect, the latter on arrival at the cemetery being taken inside the chapel, which for a short period they adorned

Others were from the Parks Committee and the Highways Committee of the Corporation, with which our Brother was connected; the Blackley, Cheetham, Collyhurst, and St. Michael's Ward Conservative Clubs, and also from deceased's tenants, a small amount having been tendered by each one for this purpose, with a spontanity which considerably enhanced the value of their humble but grateful offering.

After the funeral, many friends returned to Green Mount, where a light repast had been provided. Here the Rev. C. F. Ward made a touching reference to the sad event of the

day, and paid a fitting tribute to the memory of the deceased. He exhorted Mrs. Mills not to be downhearted under her sudden affliction, reminding her that she had found a number of friends who had endeavoured to sustain her, and to whom she must feel grateful for the valuable assistance which they had rendered in her time of need.

On the following Sunday morning (30th October), a memorial service was preached at the Albert Memorial Church by the Rector, there being a very large congregation, which included not only relatives and private friends, but Masonic friends from the Wilton, Queen Victoria, Wolseley, De Grey and Ripon Lodges, the deceased's employees, and members of Conservative Associations in North and North-West Manchester. The preacher referred in eloquent terms to those admirable characteristics of the deceased Councillor, which had endeared him to all who were in close communion with him, and in other ways had gained for him widespread esteem and affection. The "Dead March" in "Saul," which was played on the organ, concluded the mournful ceremony.

The death of Bro. Mills will be deeply felt, not only in his own home, but by deserving and indigent poor, by the Masonic world, and by the munipical body. He was a finely proportioned man, and looked the embodiment of health, he possessed an equable temperament, finding, like Jack Point, "humour in all things." His presence was stimulating, and he radiated smiles wherever he went, but in the midst of our profound sorrow we are proud we have this consolation left—that his loss has evoked such universal tributes of respect.

Father Gruber, S.J., has just published in Berlin, at the office of the Germania, an important work on Masonry, dealing with the "efforts at re-union and eternal struggles of German Masonry from 1866." Based almost entirely on official documents the first chapter shows how the German Brethren regarded the sect as an instrument of the Culturkampf, and colloquies and negotiations are referred to between Prince Bismarck and Bluntschi, the head of German Masonry. The triumph of German unity was thought to herald the golden age of the sect, and the bonds of association were drawn closer by the institution, in 1872, of the Union of Grand Lodges, and later of a National Grand Lodge. Dissensions, notwishstanding, have arisen between the three older Prussian Lodges and those of the more recent establishment, from the claim of the former to found all Lodges throughout Germany, and their refusal to admit Jews. The second chapter records the progress of the struggle against these pretensions, and the third gives a picture of the various dissensions between the Lodges, incidentally throwing light on many subjects which gave rise to journalistic controversy at the time. In conclusion Father Gruber publishes the Masonic statutes, with a list of the various German Lodges, and describes the stratagems and contrivances resorted to in order to evade the law prohibitory of secret societies.—" Tablet."

MASONIC IMPOSTOR AT RETFORD.

MASONIC IMPOSTOR AT RETFORD.

A The Retford Borough Police Court, on Monday, a middle-aged man, giving the name of David Macdonald, was brought up in custody charged with obtaining five shillings from Captain Valpy Thomas by false pretences, says the "Nottingham Guardian." Mr. W. A. Charles prosecuted.

Captain Thomas said the prisoner came to him on Sunday night, the 23rd, and said he wanted to see him on Masonic business. He was under difficulties, as he took his ticket from Edinburgh the previous morning, and when at Northallerton tickets were examined, and he was pulled out of the carriage, as he could not find his ticket. A gentleman in the same compartment told the officials he had seen prisoner show his ticket at the last examining place. They made him pay his fare from Newcastle, and the gentleman paid his fare as far as Retford. This gentleman told him his name was Luke, and that he was to give Captain Thomas this name and ask him to help him on to London. He said he had telegraphed to London for some money, but had been unable to get to the post-office, as it was closed on Sunday, and it was absolutely necessary he should be in London next morning to sign for his ship. He said he was an engineer on board the Iona, Thompson and Co., of Dundee, and 27 Leadenhall Street, London. He asked for his certificate, and he made an excuse that it had gone round aboard ship with his luggage from Leith. He produced a printed circular of the Blagdon Lodge, No. 659, and he advanced him five shillings. He telegraphed to Doncaster, and found the prisoner had been relieved there on the Friday night, and he then went in search of him, and found him drinking in a public house, and arrested him.

Prisoner was sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labour.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

YESTERDAY (20th September) will be ever memorable in the annals of Freemasonry in Western Australia, witnessing as it did the installation of His Excellency the Governor as Master of the District Grand Lodge of that colony. Although a Masonic Lodge was established in Western Australia as early as 1843, the progress of the Craft, like that of the colony, was, until recent years, extremely slow. The foundations of the Order were, however, well and truly laid, with the result that latterly the advancement of Freemasonry has kept in step with the onward march of the country. When, eleven years ago, a District Grand Lodge was established in the colony, only six Lodges were in existence, all being incorporated under the English Constitution, whereas to-day the number of English Lodges has grown to thirty-one, while in addition no less than fifteen Lodges have been formed under the Scotch Constitution, under which a District Grand Lodge has also been established.

The first District Grand Master of the English Grand Lodge was Bro. J. A. Wright, who, until yesterday, had continued to hold, with credit to himself and advantage to the Craft, that high office. Owing, however, to his official duties demanding his constant presence at a distance remote from the metropolis, and to the increasing burdens of his Masonic duties, consequent upon the rapid extension of the Order, Bro. Wright some months ago placed his resignation in the hands of the Grand Master H.R.H. the Prince of Wales. While Bro. Wright's retirement has given occasion for much regret, that regret has been tempered by the wisdom exercised by the Grand Master in selecting His Excellency the Governor Sir Gerard Smith as the future head of Freemasonry in Western Australia. No further evidence is needed on this point than was afforded by the ceremonies of yesterday.

The attendance was a record one. Only three Lodges in the colony were unrepresented, and the number of Brethren present must have closely approximated, if it did not exceed,

Prior to the installation ceremony the annual District Communication, which had been deferred from April last, was held under the presidency of the retiring District Grand Master, the business being of a purely formal character.

Master, the business being of a purely formal character.

The ceremony of installing His Excellency the Governor Sir Gerard Smith, K.C.M.G., as the new District Grand Master was announced to commence shortly after six o'clock, at which hour the large Lodge room of the Freemasons' Hall was filled as it had never been filled before. The District Grand Master officiated as Installing Officer, and the ceremony, having regard to the rarity of its occurrence, was performed in a manner highly creditable to the District. The ornate ritual prescribed for such occasions was duly observed, and the artistic effect produced by the proceedings was considerably hightened and enchanced by the incidental music, rendered with his usual skill by Bro. W. Ernest Crome District Grand Organist. The installation of the District Grand Master was followed by the investiture of the District Grand Officers for the ensuing year, by His Excellency. This completed the formal ceremony, and the District Grand Lodge became forthwith fully and regularly constituted.

The District Grand Master having expressed his sense of the honour which had been conferred upon him, first, by His Royal Highness the Grand Master in appointing him to the highest Masonic post in his gift in Western Australia; secondly, by the Brethren, in having gathered round him in such truly splendid numbers on the occasion; and, lastly, by the District Grand Master and Officers of the District Grand Lodge of the Scottish Constitution, who, with so many of the Scotch Brethren, were present to witness his installation.

Bro. Rowe D.G.M. of the Scotch District Grand Lodge

Bro. Rowe D.G.M. of the Scotch District Grand Lodge subsequently felicitated His Excellency upon his installation, as also did the Installing Master, after which, certain formal business being disposed of, the District Grand Lodge was declared closed.

His Excellency the new District Grand Master is a Freemason of nearly twenty years standing, having been initiated on 4th May 1880, in the Studholme Lodge, No. 1591, London. It may be interesting to recall the fact that H.R.H. the late Duke of Clarence, only a year prior to his untimely demise, had been, in accordance with ancient usage, where members of the Royal family are concerned, elected the permanent Master of this famous metropolitan Lodge. The new District Grand Master is also a member of the Studholme Royal Arch Chapter, to which he was admitted

on 27th March 1885. On leaving England to assume the administration of the Government of the colony His Excellency was honoured by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales Grand Master of the Order with the rank of Past Grand Warden of England. Since becoming a Freemason His Excellency has taken an active interest in all matters appertaining to the Order. Some years prior to leaving England, his euthusiasm was rewarded by his election to the Worshipful Master's chair of his Mother Lodge, which in the case of the Studholme Lodge is a real distinction. It is no matter of surprise that one so closely attached to Freemasonry, and so thoroughly alive to its distinguishing characteristics of loyalty and benevolence as His Excellency, should have identified himself with the Order in Western Australia immediately upon entering upon his vice-regal duties. He at once became affiliated with St. George Lodge, and later was one of the founders of the Military Lodge, of which he became the first Worshipful Master. It need hardly be said in the light of the foregoing that His Excellency's Masonic career has been such as to warrant the hope that during his tenure of office as District Grand Master in Western Australia his enthusiasm will, as far as the Brethren generally are concerned, prove contagious, and that when the time comes for His Excellency to hand over the high trust with which he has been commissioned the Order will have flourished even more rapidly than in the past as regards numbers, and have more than ever distinguished itself by its good works. Not only is Freemasonry honoured by Sir Gerard Smith's appointment to the post of District Grand Master, but, as His Excellency himself would be the first to admit, the honour is mutual, for to such an eminence has the credit of Freemasonry been advanced that rulers and distinguished persons in every age have not thought it derogatory to their dignity to patronise its mysteries and join in the assemblies.

Later in the evening a banquet was held in the banqueting hall to commemorate the occasion. At this entertainment about 150 Brethren were present, and at its close a brief toast list was disposed of.—" West Australian."

MEETING of subscribers to the Devon Masonic Educational Fund was held on the 1st inst., at the Freemasons' Hall, Plymouth, for the election of a candidate on the fund. Bro. C. S. CHURCH SERVICES.

N altogether unique ceremony, so far as Hampstead or its immediate neighbourhood is concerned, took place on Sunday afternoon, 23rd ult., at the Church of St. Martin, Gospel Oak. A handsome chancel screen and brass lectern had been subscribed for by the Brethren of the Hampstead and Loyalty Lodges, and other Freemasons, and the occasion was the dedication of that Masonic offering, and an offertory to clear off the deficiency in the amount required for the work.

Brethren to the number of over 200 assembled in the school room, robed there, and, in procession, walked across to the church. The perfect arrangement and order of this procession was due to Bro. James Terry P.G.S.B., whose great knowledge and experience in such matters resulted in that success in the church itself which may be well described as "absence of confusion." It would be extremely difficult to find a better Director of Ceremony than Bro. Terry, and equally difficult to select a worthier coadjutor than was supplied in Bro. N. Hanhart D.C. of the Hampstead Lodge. Most valuable assistance in the details of arrangement in the church was afforded by Bro. Dr. F. H. Gervis I.P.M. of the Hampstead Lodge.

It need scarcely be said that such a procession as was seen

on Sunday caused considerable excitement in the neighbourhood. and indeed the rich regalia and clothing of the Clergy, Grand Officers, and Brethren, were strikingly impressive, and gave rise to much comment and friendly criticism. The Hampstead Lodge

was, naturally, well represented.

The musical portion of the service was splendidly performed, and especial thanks are due to Bro. Reginald V. F. Seton P.M., choirmaster of St. Martin's, and to Bro. Frank S. N. Isitt, Organist of the Hampstead Lodge, who so ably presided at the

The local clergy were well represented, amongst the Rev. Brethren being Bros. G. C. Blaxland, vicar of St. Andrew's; P. D. Jones, curate of St. Andrew's; G. A. Herklots, vicar of St. Saviour's; C. H. Venning and E. Dakin, curates of St. Martin's.

The Bishop of Marlborough, who was to have preached, was

unfortunately prevented by illness from attending. Bro. the Rev. Dr. Seaver P.M. 36 acted as Chaplain and preacher. The services were read by Bro. the Rev. W. Harrison, and the lesson was read by Bro. the Rev. W. H. W. Casely P.P.G.C. Herts. The initiation of the ceremony, and the earnest and hard work in carring it through to so successful an end, must be placed at the door of the Rev. T. H. Russell, vicar of St. Martin's, and

Chaplain of the Hampstead Lodge.

The edifice itself is one of remarkable architectural beauty, full of originality of detail and composition, erected from the designs of the late E. B. Lamb. The church, schools, vicarage, and endowment owe their origin to the almost princely liberality of the late Bro. Derby Allcroft, the present patron being Mr. Herbert Allcroft. The history of the church, immediately preceding the induction of the Rev. T. H. Russell, was lamentable, but, thanks to the efforts of earnest workers, the church is now restored to decency, and the various architectural alterations restored to decency, and the various architectural alterations made are satisfactory and lend additional charm to the edifice. The effect on Sunday, when the church was filled to overflowing with earnest worshippers, heightened by the Masonic clothing and jewels of the Brethren, was most impressive, the body of sound sent forth in the singing of the favourite old hymns, "All people that on earth do dwell," and "O God our help in ages past," being particularly striking.

We have already expressed regret at the absence of the

Bishop of Marlborough, but a treat was in store for those who appreciate a good sermon. Bro. the Rev. Dr. Seaver was called upon, at about two hours' notice, to fill the place of the Bishop, and he took as his theme the stone quarry from which was taken the material for building Solomon's Holy Temple. Beautiful imagery and food for sublime thought were opened up by the preacher in his eloquent address. The various blocks of stone in the quarry were described, with their symbolic representations, the one worked by the skilful mason for the "pinnacle," the admired of admirers; another for the less prominent but equally useful "ashlar"; another roughly hewn, but strong, sturdy, and honest, for the foundation of the edifice, and so on. Then the preacher, with singular oratorical skill, turned to the stones rejected by the builder, and conveyed a long to be remembered lesson when he pictured those rejected ones left after so many centuries in the quarry itself as unworthy of forming any part of the magnificent Temple.—" Hampstead Express."
